Redesigning Landscapes

Need some inspiration, or just want to get a few hints on what to do to rejuvenate your home's landscaping? Come to our May meeting to hear from University of Maryland Extension Master Gardener, Susan Bell presenting "Redesigning Landscapes."

Susan has been a speaker with the Master Gardener program for the past five years. She is an expert in providing guidance to professionals and homeowners on garden design for neighborhoods such as Hillandale. As a licensed landscape contractor, Susan has focused on "one-day garden makeovers." Included in her talk will be topics such as landscape redesign, pruning of old plantings, strategies to lessen water usage, methods to reduce maintenance requirements, practical lessening of lawn areas and how to add that WOW factor to your home's visual appeal. There will be the opportunity to ask questions.

A Master Plan Work Session

For Hillandale Residents

Thursday, May 9, 7:30 PM, at CHI

Over the past few years there has been a lot of talk about the future of the area, and we have heard from planners, developers and transportation experts. **Now is the time for residents to officially weigh in on two specific Master Plans (Bus Rapid Transit and White Oak Science Gateway) that will guide future development.** A brief overview of both plans will be provided focusing on Hillandale, followed by open discussion. The goal of this work session is to reach consensus recommendations for HCA to take forward to the Montgomery County Planning Board.

If you have attended previous meetings on these plans, or if you have not, please attend this work session and provide your input. Now is the time to voice your support, concerns or ideas on these plans. Your input is valuable and very much desired through the approval process for both plans.

MULCH VOLCANOS

Is it a good idea to pile mulch around the base of a tree?

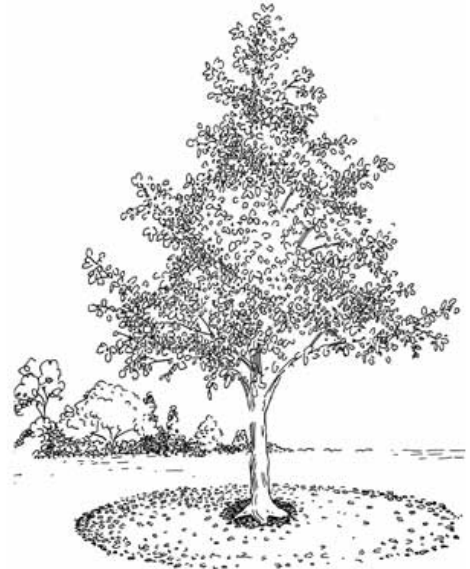
Mulch “rings” around trees, 2-4 inches deep, can protect the tree from lawn mowers and trimmers and help retain soil moisture, But, this is a case of “some is good; more is NOT better.”

Piling mulch up a like a “volcano” can slowly kill the tree. A tree naturally grows with its root flare at ground level. The base of the trunk and the root crown should be exposed.

Mulching above the root flare can:

- harbor bacteria or fungi that decompose the bark;
- harbor insects or rodents that feed on bark;
- encourage the growth of hair-like roots above the root crown – these are not feeder roots – they are vulnerable to drying out in dry weather, or if allowed to grow, can girdle the tree.

In many cases, just moving the mulch away from the trunk at the root flare will help.

Neighborhood News and Tidbits

Hillandale Local Park: Park Department planners have notified HCA that the facility planning for the Park’s renovation will not begin until sometime in the fall. This is a one-year delay in the planning effort that was to begin last fall! Once started, the planning phase will take a year. It is anticipated that the funding for the renovation project will be proposed in the County’s biennial FY17-22 CIP Budget. Plans for the closing and demolition of the existing Park Activity Building have not been delayed.

Addressing Panhandling in MoCo: Later this summer, the County Executive will be introducing legislation to require permits for panhandling on Montgomery County streets. Neither the cost/duration of the permits, or the costs of the administration/enforcement are known at this time. Prior to any implementation, the County will roll out an information campaign to educate the public that donating to reputable charities is a far better option for helping the homeless and needy in our community.

HCA Testified on County Operating Budget: During the April public hearing for the Montgomery County FY14 Operating Budget, HCA requested additional County resources be spent on residential road resurfacing and roadside tree replanting. Council is on track to make these increases in the budget. HCA also proposed two additional programs for the Department of Housing and Community Development. The first was to have the County begin to inspect single-family rental homes as part of the licensing procedure. The second was to have the County begin to address the issue of vacant/abandoned homes with the goal of returning these homes to the market. The Council’s oversight committee did not embrace these requests. Final action on the budget will happen in mid-May.
